

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The belief that books "teach, entertain, and educate" has an impact on shaping an active reading attitude, and one of the ways to shape this attitude is to set up a "reading corner" in the kindergarten classroom.



Reading corners are set up in each age group.

In a group of 3 and 4 year olds, the reading corner contains several to a dozen items. Due to the fact that children in this age range like to look at the same books, it is a good idea to place several copies of the same book. This will make it easier for children to have verbal contact with each other while exchanging comments on a particular book.

In the youngest preschoolers' corner, there should be books with more illustrations than text. The illustration is a very important element of a children's book. Its role is even greater the younger the reader is.



In older age groups, the role of the reading corner becomes more important. Children already know that in books they can find answers to various questions, that in addition to illustrations they contain interesting and often funny text.

The book corner in the group of six-year-olds plays an important role in developing reading skills. Children not only ask the teacher to read to them, but they often try to find a familiar letter in the text or read an easy word on their own.





Reading corners

The reading corner should be a place for children's expression and reflection triggered by the content of the reading. These will be expressed through puppets, pacemakers and children's artwork.

Playing with Books:

1. Poems for drawing:

- ✓ is a form of exercise that stimulates cognitive processes, e.g. perception, thinking, attention, and also strengthens motivation for graphomotor activities.
- ✓ These are drawings, the creation of which is accompanied by rhymes, describing the emerging image.
- ✓ They are a form of relaxation for hyperactive children and stimulate inhibited children.

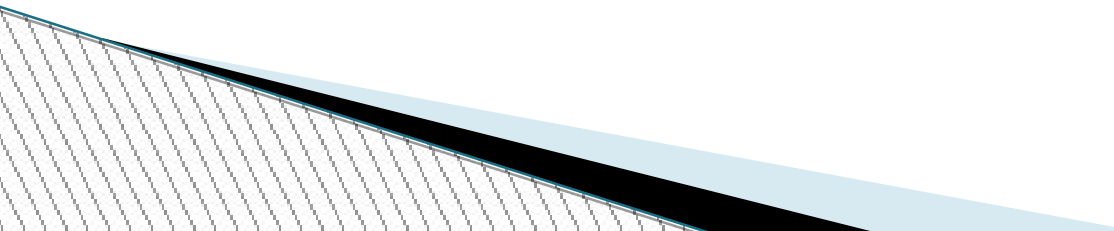
2. composing texts of simple fairy tales:

- ✓ children independently tell fairy tales to their friends from other groups.

3. "Older to younger":

- ✓ 6-year-old preschoolers read short poems to children from younger groups.
- ✓ As part of the 16th National Children's Reading Week "Older Children Read to Younger Children" children from older groups read Julian Tuwim's poem "Locomotive" to the youngest children.

4. "Kindergarten Book Day": bringing a favorite book to kindergarten for one day.

- A kindergarten book lending library "A Book for the Weekend" was established.

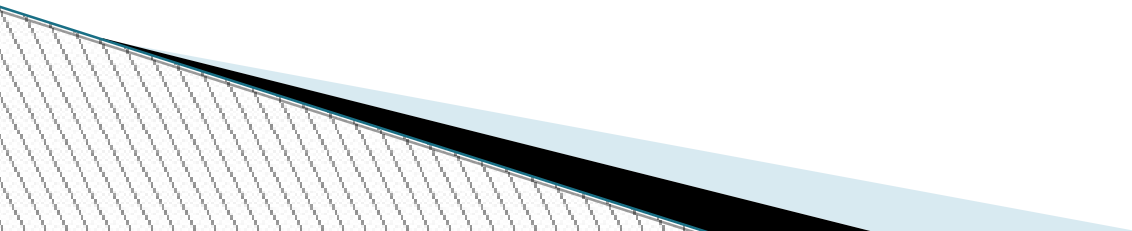

As part of our preschoolers' interest in books, a children's literature club was formed.

As part of the club activities the following were organized

1. The action "Little Pole" as a part of activities organized in the "Year for the Independent" – 6-year-old children read selected patriotic poems to the "little ones .

2. "Playing theater" – reading meeting

A meeting with a representative of the Municipal Library in Giżycko during which there were various games connected with theater. Preschoolers, joining the "All of Poland Reads to Kids" campaign, listened to fairy tales read by a library worker.

3. "Light up blue" – On April 3rd (every year) – the kindergarten participated in the World Autism Awareness Day. The preschoolers and teachers wore blue as a sign of solidarity with children with autism. The teachers read stories about autism to the children, e.g. "Kosmita" by R. Jędrzejewska-Wróbel, "Owl Kamila" by Paweł Księżyk, "Czarodziejka" by J. M. Chmielewska.

4. "International Book Day" – Students from the First High School in Gizycko read their favorite and best known fairy tales to children from each age group.

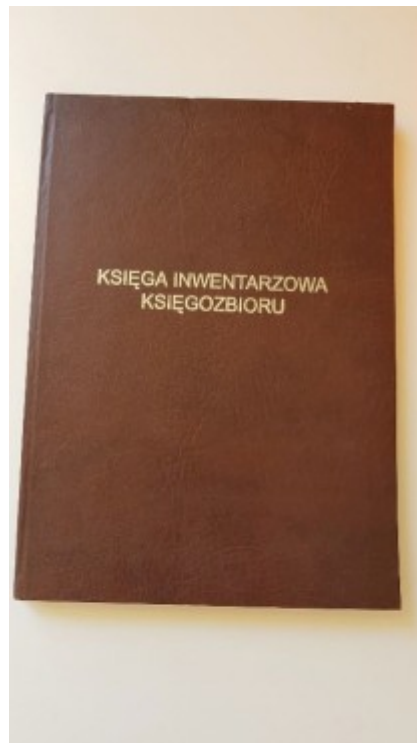
